I am delighted to update you in this edition of the school newsletter about the recent changes to the tutor group system that was introduced at the start of this half term. As you will be aware we made the






HOUSE CHAMPIONSHIP FRIDAY CHALLENGE

YEAR 11 EXAM MESSAGES

GCSE exams begin on Monday 6th May. Year 11 have had an assembly taking them through the exams process. They have also received paper copies of their exam timetables from their tutors and they will also receive a digital copy via email. Any year 11s who missed the assembly can watch a recording which Miss Sayers sent out via epraise.

Throughout the exam period, Year 11 will remain in school and, when they don't have exams, they will be in their timetabled lessons. This is to ensure that year 11 stay in positive routines, have a guaranteed quiet environment in which to revise, and can get as much time in front of expert teachers as possible. As Year 11 complete exams in their subjects, they will still attend these lessons on their timetables or they will have boosters for subjects of upcoming exams. In lessons where Year 11s have completed all of their exams, they will spend the time completing independent revision under the supervision of their teachers.

All of Year 11 need to be available until **Wednesday 26**th **June**, though school is likely to finish for year 11 before this date. Further details about year 11's last day will be communicated at the end of term 5.

EXAM EQUIPMENT

For their exams, Year 11 will need:

- ☑ A pencil
- ☑ At least one black pen (ideally two)
- ☑ A ruler (ideally 30cm)
- ☑ A rubber without any marks or writing on it
- ☑ A pencil sharpener
- ☑ A protractor
- ☑ A compass
- ✓ A scientific calculator without a case and with no writing or doodling on it
- ☑ A completely clear pencil case with no writing or decoration on it

Students can also take a water bottle into the exam with them; this must be completely clear and cannot have any writing or decoration on it.

We are also offering 'exam ready pencil cases' for purchase at cost on ParentPay. These pencil cases contain everything on the list above except for a compass and a scientific calculator. If you order a pencil case, Miss Sayers will deliver it to students during tutor time.

There are several items which students are not allowed on their person during exams.

- In they must not wear their blazer
- They should not have any electronic items on their person, even if they are turned off. This includes mobile phones, smartwatches, and headphones.
- Year 11 must also ensure that they don't accidentally bring any notes or paper with writing on them into their exams and that they do not have any notes or writing on their hands or anywhere else on their person.



EXAM TIMINGS

When year 11 have a morning exam, they will be able to have a free breakfast in the diner and, after roll call, they will go into a booster session with their head of subject or their subject teacher.

These sessions are designed to give year 11 the final support and guidance they need in order to be as successful as possible. After the booster, Year 11 will have time to put all non-necessary equipment and their blazers in their lockers before lining up in exam lines in the gym.

Morning exams will begin at 09:30. Year 11 should be in from the beginning of the school day. However, in the event of lateness, they must attend by 09:30. Otherwise there is a risk that they won't be able to take the exam.

Afternoon exams begin at 13:30. The routine is roughly the same as for morning exams, except that Year 11 won't receive breakfast beforehand. When Year 11 have an afternoon exam, they are expected in school at the normal time for the beginning of the school day.

THE SUMMER BALL

This year our Summer Ball will be held on 5th July at the Village Hotel in Swindon. Guests can begin arriving from 18:00 and will be let into the ballroom from 19:00. The meal will begin at roughly 19:15. Please feel free to come along to see your child and their friends arrive to the hotel and to get some photos! Once guests enter the hotel, they can go to a garden area in which they can have mocktails before entering the ballroom. This space is reserved for guests only.

If your child would like to attend the Summer Ball, tickets are available for purchase on ParentPay. If your child has ordered any discount vouchers via Epraise, the value of these vouchers will be refunded to you during term 5. The final deadline to purchase tickets is Friday 21st June.







VIP EXPERIENCE

19 Year 11s will also receive special VIP passes to highlight their excellent attitude in a particular subject or their improvements and contributions around the school as a whole. DISC VIPs will have access to a VIP area during the Summer Ball, and will be able to order a range of house-themed nonalcoholic mocktails from their own personal bartender (Miss Sayers!).

VIP passes will be awarded during Nova Fest on 27th June. If your child receives a VIP pass, they will still need to have purchased a ticket in order to attend the Summer Ball.



NOVA FEST AND THE YEAR 11 LEAVERS' ASSEMBLY

As part of our celebrations for Year 11 at the end of this year, we are hosting 'Nova Fest' on Thursday 27th June. This is a free, informal celebration for Year 11 which will be combined with their leavers' assembly. All of Year 11 are invited to school for the afternoon and, in addition to speeches and awards during the leavers' assembly, there will be a barbeque and a range of activities available, such as inflatables and a photo booth.

The plan for the day is as follows:

Year 11 do not need to wear uniform to attend Nova Fest. However, we recommend that they wear sports clothing or their PE kit so that they can participate in all of the activities. Year 11s can bring a shirt with them to be signed, but they have to carry it with them separately.

TRIP TO BLETCHLEY PARK

On Wednesday 1st May, a group of Year 7 and Year 10 students went to Bletchley Park and had a day filled with exploring an iconic and integral landmark that was used for deciphering secrets and coding messages. The visit was a combined maths and computing trip.

Bletchley Park codebreakers are estimated to have shortened the war by up to two years through their intelligence work and our students were able to explore the iconic site and learn about the work that was done there.

A coding and ciphers workshop was delivered by a lady whose parents were from Cambridge University and Oxford University, and had been recruited to work at Bletchley during the war. They met at Bletchley Park and got married. Her father's best man at the wedding was John Cairncross himself (huge gasp from Mrs Malik when we heard this)! She was wonderful and even showed us a real enigma machine (worth over £500,000) which we were allowed to press at the end of the workshop.

We were also led on a very informative tour by a retired gentleman volunteer who had us wearing props and his real Cambridge University scarf as part of the tour. The heavy fire helmet was given to the eldest in the groups first (aka the teachers) then passed round for all to try on.



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
extravaganza.

MATHS NEWS

Nova students have surpassed 1.5 Million correctly answered Sparx questions! We are still the top school in Swindon, frequently in the top 10 for UL (Y11s more than whole school) and in the top 10% of all of Sparx schools.



The trip to Bletchley Park was just one of the rewards for students working hard at their studies, and the requirement for students having Sparx done regularly was part of the eligibility requirements. 7C had won class of the week multiple times over the last few months since September which is why they and our Y10 further maths groups were given first chance to book before the rest of Y7 and Y10.

The maths, computing and business department offer an array of trips alongside regular Tuesday lunchtime and afterschool Sparx support, Wednesday iMedia intervention and a 2-tiered support vs detention process for 75%+ completion vs <75%.

School behaviour standards and Sparx will remain part of the requirements to ensure eligibility for the faculty's trips which are listed below but not limited to these:

Y11 PGL revision weekend (maths plus maths for science) - booking now open for Y10 (Sparx, lesson engagement and DISC behaviour will be required to remain eligible).

Y10 Harry Potter studios (maths and iMedia) - fully booked with a waiting list (Sparx, lesson engagement, coursework completion and DISC behaviour will be required to remain eligible).

Y9 Bath University (maths and wider STEM) - booking will open next academic year.

Y8 Legoland (Robotics and wider STEM) booking will open to current Y7s before summer holidays.

Y7 Bletchley Park (maths and computing) booking will open next winter term for new Y7s starting in September.

KS4 Cadbury World (Business)

Y7-11 Sparx Reward trips (we've had bowling, retro gaming and VR gaming in the past).
